To ensure philanthropic actors around the world have the knowledge, tools and supportive environment required to create transformative change at an individual, local and global level.



Message from the Executive Director and Board Chair

Looking back at what we were able to achieve together in 2019 as a global network, as a community of changemakers and thought leaders in philanthropy, seems like a world away. Although nothing could have prepared us for what would unfold in 2020, retrospectively, it feels like what we did in 2019 and the strategic directions we decided to pursue were the right ones. They've put us in a position to play an even more important role in a new global landscape where international coordination, advocacy, bridge-building and ecosystems strengthening for sustainable civil society resourcing has never been more needed.

Our activity in 2019 is broadly summarised by three key terms: advocacy, ecosystems, inclusive network.

Advocacy. WINGS began to fill the gap in our sector to collectively organise its voice at the global level to speak to policy issues that affect our field, and to help build bridges with other actors such as governments and multilateral organisations. Our series of side events at the UN General Assembly allowed us to engage in important discussions with key global players and offered us the opportunity to represent the philanthropy field in various instances such as the Steering Committee of the Global Partnership for Effective Development Cooperation. We were also invited to lead the Sustainable Development Goals Philanthropy Platform alongside our partners at the United Nations Development Program while we continued working with our members on key issues such as the Financial Action Task Force's policies. While this is just a start, we are thrilled that philanthropy is finally starting to speak with one voice. Beyond this much needed global effort, we also worked with our members who are at the forefront of advocacy for an enabling environment at national and regional levels. We were proud to launch a set of case studies that illustrated how networks and support organisations can best influence policy makers and governments in the context of a shrinking civic space. In line with this, we developed a new tool together with the International Center for Not-for-Profit Law to help organisations become more effective in this work.

Ecosystems. We continued to spread the word about #LiftUpPhilanthropy and facilitated conversations in various parts of the world such as Russia, Brazil and Europe, about the critical need to pro-

mote strategic investments and collaboration in the ecosystem, as well as conversations on building an infrastructure that supports and develops philanthropy. In our constant effort to provide concrete tools to philanthropy developers, we organised an international meeting for network and association leaders in Jamaica in March where we discussed the features of the philanthropy network of the future, which led to the publication in early 2020 of a guide to invent - or re-invent - philanthropy associations and networks. Knowing the critical catalytic role philanthropy networks are playing in their ecosystems, we hope it will make an important contribution to building a more robust and future-proof philanthropy sector worldwide.

Inclusive network. 2019 was a year of exceptional growth for our global community (+40% with 154 members). Our new membership policy has made it possible to include the entire diversity of the organisations that develop philanthropy, from networks of grantmakers to online giving platforms and social businesses committed to growing and improving giving in their context. We have created a supporting member category to allow those who want to support global philanthropy's development – private foundations, development funders and other relevant stakeholders - to join us and have their own space to discuss strategies for effective infrastructure funding.

These achievements, although they are just initial steps on the long road towards a more effective and thriving philanthropy, are extremely important to prepare the ground for the work we need to continue doing together over the coming years. In a world where civil society's space is increasingly threatened, effective private resources have never been as needed to help create a better world. All of this is only possible because of the extraordinary involvement of our members, partners, volunteers and team. More than ever, philanthropy must come together. More than ever, we need you to continue supporting our collective efforts towards a more just, equitable and sustainable world. Thank you for being on this journey together with us.





Toolkit: Assessing the Legal Environment for Civil Society Organizations

Designed with the International Center for Not-for-Profit Law (ICNL), the **Assessing the Legal Environment for Civil Society Organizations** is a three-part tool to help philanthropy organizations decide how to engage in efforts to improve the legal environment at the national and/or regional levels. This is done by encouraging organizations to think critically about a variety of relevant factors in the process of engaging in specific strategies.

While there is no magical formula for determining whether engagement on a given issue will be worthwhile, this tool seeks to lay out the most important considerations and guide organizations to analyze them both individually and in relation to each other.

Infrastructure in Focus: A New Global Picture of Organizations Serving Philanthropy

Published in 2017, **Infrastructure in Focus** aims to increase knowledge and understanding about philanthropy infrastructure and raise awareness of its importance. Originally published in 2014, in its latest edition, the report shows a new global picture of philanthropy infrastructure and reflects on how we, as a field, can grow and strengthen philanthropy infrastructure worldwide.

Using the 4Cs: Evaluating Professional Support to Philanthropy

The 4Cs Framework was developed in partnership with DAFNE to increase the capacity of philanthropy support organizations to plan, monitor and assess their impact, based on four main categories: Capacity, Capability, Credibility and Connections. Launched during the WINGSForum 2017 in Mexico, the framework acts as an evaluation system for organizations that support philanthropy and helps identify and demonstrate its worth.

DAFNE Winter Meeting - #LiftUpPhilanthropy: The Future of Funding of Philanthropy Infrastructure Workshop

On January 18, Benjamin Bellego, our Executive Director led this session, with moderation by Rosa Gallego, the Director of International Relations, Regional Groups and Finances of the Asociación Española de Fundaciones – AEF (Spanish Association of Foundations).

The discussion provided concrete ideas on how to adjust narratives to engage differently with funders. The workshop also covered how to support the #LiftUpPhilanthropy campaign, a global and open conversation to raise the strategic importance and value of the development of philanthropy, and how to identify concrete individual and collective actions to champion this cause.

Co-hosting the Russian Donors Forum and participation as panelist at Blagosfera

On January 21, we co-hosted a meeting with the Russian Donors Forum and the Vladimir Potanin Foundation in Moscow attended by around 20 Russian leaders. On January 22, our Executive Director, Benjamin Bellego, joined an event at Blagosfera where he presented an ecosystem approach to philanthropy infrastructure actors and engaged the audience in active discussion on ways to strengthen the ecosystem in Russia.

As a result of this discussion the Vladimir Potanin Philanthropy Development Center has decided to embark on a mapping study on the Russian philanthropy infrastructure.

Strengthening the Philanthropy Support Ecosystem in Brazil

The project, supported by the Brazil Foundation explored the trends, opportunities, and barriers to the philanthropy support ecosystem in Brazil, and how its strengthening could lead to a more enabling environment for various forms of philanthropy to thrive.

In February, we hosted an introductory meeting followed by a workshop in March, during which the participants worked on an initial mapping of the initiatives, relevant topics for ecosystem discussion in Brazil, the key actors involved in ecosystem discussion and reflected on concrete actions to foster an enabling environment for philanthropy.

In November, we supported a public workshop for 35 representatives from 29 organizations working in the Brazilian ecosystem with Movimento por uma Cultura de Doação, an initiative to connect key actors on the promotion of the culture of giving in Brazil.

Driving Philanthropy for the Future. Creating the Networks We Need

This peer-learning event, co-hosted by the Caribbean Philanthropic Network, took place on April 23-26th in Kingston, Jamaica and focused on philanthropy associations and networks.

The meeting brought together 69 leaders of both emerging and established philanthropy networks and associations from across the world, to discuss the future of networks.

The event aimed to help the newer networks form and consolidate; reflect on the future of our sector; and build the capacity of the organizations by learning new knowledge, covering technical issues, as well as presenting new thought-leadership in the field.

The results of the meeting featured in the [Philanthropy Networks: Creating Value, Voice and Collective Impact](#) report published early 2020. It has also resulted in the creation of a new Caribbean Philanthropy Network whose first meeting was held using the same framework of our event.

On April 30, we organized a networking event for 40 participants at the Council on Foundations Leading Together Conference in Miami, USA.

On June 27th, we hosted a networking event at the AVPN conference in Singapore.

Philanthropy and the SDGs: How Philanthropy can Engage with the SDGs to Unlock its Full Potential

On July 15th, we attended the SDG Philanthropy Platform meeting at the High Level Political Forum Week event in New York - with Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors. During the event, with 26 participants, Benjamin Bellegly shared the importance of unlocking philanthropy's potential for the SDGs, and the need for philanthropy to advocate for the sector and the SDGs.

Philanthropy and the SDGs - Aligning for Impact

On July 16th, we participated in a workshop on the role of philanthropy for national development in New York. The event was organized by the SDG Philanthropy Platform, the Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors and the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs as part of the High Level Political Forum. Benjamin Bellegy presented how to tap into global philanthropy networks using the SDGs.

Side Events to the United Nations General Assembly

In September, we partnered with other organizations to run three side events to the 74th UN General Assembly in New York.

The first, [Unlocking Philanthropy's Potential for Development](#), held on September 25th at the Ford Foundation. It was organized with the Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors and United Nations Development Programme within the framework of the SDG Philanthropy Platform and in partnership with Aga Khan Foundation, La Caixa Foundation and Charities Aid Foundation. This meeting discussed finding pathways for multi-sector collaboration on the SDGs and opportunities for accelerating growth and improving private resources' effectiveness, especially in emerging markets and the Global South.

The [Boosting Domestic Philanthropy and Giving in and for the Global South](#), a round table discussion hosted at the United Nations Development Programme headquarters on September 26th, highlighted the potential role of development funders in empowering and enhancing domestic philanthropy, and showcased innovative approaches implemented on the ground.

The **How philanthropy and youth-led groups are contributing to accelerate the SDGs implementation and accountability** event with CIVICUS brought together youth leaders from Asia, Africa, and Latin America. Participants exchanged experiences on the challenges to scale-up youth-led initiatives, including national legal frameworks, short-term visions, and a lack of core support.

2nd Regional Meeting for Latin America and the Caribbean - Finding Common Paths to Fostering an Enabling Environment in the Region

On October 29th and 30th, we hosted a two-day meeting in Sao Paulo, Brazil to bring together 45 key philanthropy infrastructure actors in Latin America and the Caribbean. The event promoted peer learning, helped build regional capacity and collective understanding of the trends of the enabling environment for philanthropy in the region, and identified opportunities for collective action, especially on issues connected to FATF.

The meeting led to the publication of a Collective Declaration for a more enabling environment in the region. The document, available in [English](#), [Spanish](#)

We are calling all interested actors to join us in this effort to promote a strong, diverse, sustainable, effective, accountable and independent philanthropic sector in the region.

LAC Affinity Group members - Collective Declaration from the WINGS Latin America and the Caribbean Affinity Group

and [Portuguese](#), highlights the importance of strengthening regional coordination to promote an enabling environment and to be constructive interlocutors for authorities at the regional level. This includes discussing policies that affect the sector, including financial and private policies, and highlighting the need for all interested actors to join this effort to promote a strong, diverse, sustainable, effective, accountable and independent philanthropic sector in the region.

[Giving to Myanmar](#)

On February 14th, we hosted this webinar in partnership with the Asia Philanthropy Circle to launch the “Giving to Myanmar: A Guide for Asian Philanthropists”. The guide provides a landscape review of the country, including recommendations from experienced practitioners on the ground, relating to the regulatory framework, cultural issues, information sources, and case studies.

[Emerging Markets](#)

On February 21th, we hosted a webinar with Alliance Magazine on the development of philanthropy in emerging market economies. During the discussion, four professionals in the field explored the changes to emerging market philanthropy over the last five years.

[Next Philanthropy](#)

Hosted on February 28th, as part of the Global Landscape Series, this event explored some of the topics included in the Global Landscape of Philanthropy Report. This session looked into the trends and expected changes in the future of philanthropy and how institutions should prepare to face them.

[Giving Tuesday](#)

Organized with CAF, this webinar on March 26th, shared experiences about the Giving Tuesday campaign that has become a global success, growing in popularity year on year, breaking fundraising records and engaging countries in acts of volunteering nationally.

[Collaboration](#)

The second webinar on the Global Landscape Series, launched on March 29th, looked into collaboration among philanthropic institutions and with other sectors, as a way for philanthropy to maximise its impact, making the best use of limited resources and bringing together the respective skills of the different sectors in an effective way. It also explored what can be done to foster a more collaborative environment - not only inside the philanthropy sector - but also with the government and other actors.

[More than the Sum of its Parts](#)

This session, hosted on April 11th with Wider Sense brought the authors of the [More than the Sum of its Parts](#) report to discuss what grantmakers expect from philanthropy support infrastructure, how infrastructure can increase the effectiveness of the sector, and how to identify the demands of the sectors' constituency that will shape its development in Europe and beyond.

[Power Issues](#)

On May 7th, the final webinar of the Global Landscape Series explored how power is central in philanthropy work and the future of the sector. The webinar explored how the sector is organized nowadays in terms of power relations, and what changes should happen to represent emerging voices in philanthropy.

[Network Capacity Building with Curtis Ogden IISC Webinar](#)

On July 3rd, we invited network expert Curtis Ogden, of the Interaction Institute for Social Change, to discuss network structures and approaches, and how to apply a network mindset and effectively leverage philanthropy networks.

[Advocacy for the Philanthropic Sector](#)

On August 28th, our Latin American and Caribbean Affinity Group hosted a session to explore the role philanthropy plays in advocating for change in public policy and how as a sector we need to find more strategic ways to drive the necessary changes to thrive.

[Data Ethics in Philanthropy with Lucy Bernholz](#)

Hosted by our RADE Affinity Group Webinar, on September 25th, this webinar featured Lucy Bernholz, the Founder and Director of the Digital Civil Society Lab at Stanford's Center on Philanthropy and Civil Society. She introduced key concepts and resources for developing safe, ethical, and effective digital practices, and discussed the governance responsibilities for academics working in the field.

[Legal Pro Bono Services for Philanthropy Support Organizations](#)

During the session on October 9th, Giulia Corinaldi, Head of Programmes at TrustLaw presented their global pro bono legal program and how our members can access these services. The session also included successful experiences of collaboration between TrustLaw and organizations supporting philanthropy.

[10th Anniversary of the World Giving Index](#)

On November 14th, we hosted this session with CAF and Alliance Magazine as a celebration of the 10th anniversary of the CAF World Giving Index, and to share different perspectives on a decade's worth of data which has strengthened the culture of giving.






Number of WINGS members
